3.3 UBCITE/GVITE Industry Night/Student Paper Competition, March 25, 2004

This was the second time the Student Chapter hosted an Industry Night/Student Paper Competition. It was a wonderful opportunity for UBC students to network with professionals in the field. Those attending also got a chance to hear presentations on the latest transportation engineering research being done by our graduate students. This year, ten entries were submitted, and our panel of judges selected four finalists to make a presentation at the event on March 25. The winner of the competition won \$300, and first and second runner-ups won \$100 and \$50, respectively.

The night was a great success and was extremely well attended by industry. The chapter is working on plans for the next Industry night in 2005.

3.4 Ongoing: ITE Annual QUAD Conference in Portland, Oregon, April 23-24, 2004



Four of our executives went to Portland in late April for the QUAD conference, where professionals practicing in Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia came together to share their experiences. The trip was partially funded by the UBC Alumni Association's Walter H. Gage Memorial Fund.
